The prevention of collisions between aircraft or vehicles operating on a runway is a key performance goal of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). To measure progress in this area, FAA's Runway Safety Program Office¹ tracks all reported unauthorized intrusions onto a runway—known as runway incursions—and

categorizes them in terms of risk. The most serious incursions—events in which a

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collision is barely avoided—are designated as Category A and B.

As we noted in our July 2010 report,² the number of Category A and B incursions decreased after FAA implemented initiatives from its August 2007 Call to Action Plan for Runway Safety. However, this trend is reversing. Reported serious runway incursions increased substantially from fiscal year 2010 to fiscal year 2012, tripling from 6 to 18. Additionally, the total number of all runway incursions increased 21 percent between fiscal years 2011 and 2012, from 954 to 1,150. More concerning is that this increase occurred during a period when total air traffic operations declined slightly. In addition, FAA has recently reorganized its Runway Safety Office, and has changed the way that the Agency reports and evaluates runway incursions.

On April 12, 2013, the Ranking Member of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, Aviation Subcommittee, requested that we examine FAA's Runway Safety Program and the Agency's actions to improve safety. Accordingly, our objectives are to evaluate FAA's (1) progress in implementing initiatives to prevent runway incursions, and (2) effectiveness in reporting and evaluating runway incursions.
